INTRODUCTION TO THE BOOKLET:

SEWA is committed to safer, and more secure and resilient communities in its operational areas through world-class disaster management arrangements. The overall policy goal is to promote national vulnerability assessment, risk mitigation, disaster prevention, preparedness, effective response and recovery in a manner that integrates disaster risk management with development planning and programming. This approach will ensure people of our program areas build capacities that would enable them minimise serious social and economic disruptions as a result of disaster events.

Our disaster policy will also create an integrated and multi-sectoral systems approach to planning, preparedness and management of disasters which is fundamental to sustained productivity and socio-economic growth by 'minimising vulnerability levels of the people against natural and human-induced hazards; and to save lives and livelihood assets when disasters occur. The main thrust of this policy is to make disaster management an integral part of the development process. It recognizes the profound impact of human activity on the interrelations within the natural environment as well as the influence of population growth.

The policy also emphasizes the critical importance of restoring and maintaining the quality and overall welfare and development of human beings in their environment. In cooperation and support of governments and other concerned public and private organization, SEWA will focus to use all practicable means and measures to foster and promote the general welfare of the communities, create and maintain conditions under which they can exist in productive harmony with nature and fulfil the social, economic and other requirements of developments.

A further fundamental purpose of the policy is to advocate an approach to disaster management that focuses on reducing risks — the risk of loss of life, economic loss and damage to property. The expected outcome of this policy is a minimum state of preparedness for the country so that in every agency that has relevance to disaster preparedness, response, mitigation and recovery, there is ability and readiness to operate together in concert and harmony before, during, and after a disaster event.

THE POLICY MISSION:

The policy mission is to create an effective framework through which Disaster Preparedness and Management is entrenched in all aspects of development processes, focusing on saving lives, livelihoods and resources.

THE POLICY GOAL:

The goal is to establish organisational mechanisms that will reduce the vulnerability of people, livestock, plants and wildlife to disasters in Odisha as a whole.

POLICY OBJECTIVES:

- Generate and disseminate information on early warning for disasters and hazard trend analysis
- Promote public, private partnerships in Disaster Preparedness and Management.
- Create timely, coordinated and effective emergency responses at national, district and lower level local governments.
- Promote community resilience and economic sustainability through disaster risk reduction; and
- Promote prepared, resilient communities that understand their role in disaster management arrangements
- Disaster risk assessments are used to identify and reduce vulnerability and improve preparedness and resilience to protect life and property and contribute to sustainable communities.
